## **Presentation**

The Spanish Committee of the World Energy Council celebrates a new edition of its traditional Annual Conference, entitled "Energy and Global Governance under Transformation", on November 28th in the Auditorium of the Repsol Campus, in Madrid.

This meeting, characterized by its dynamic and interactive format and for having an international approach, is organized by the CECME and the Spanish Energy Club, with the precious collaboration of the Real Instituto Elcano, and it is sponsored by KPMG and Repsol.

In the Opening Session, we will have the pleasure of having the intervention of José Manuel Soria López, Minister of Industry, Energy and Tourism (Government of Spain), as well as the organizers and sponsors of the meeting.

Plenary Session will have the participation of Marie-José Nadeau, Secretary General of Hydro Quebec and Chair of the World Energy Council, since she was appointed in October. Through a dialogue-interview with Arturo Gonzalo Aizpiri, Chair of CECME, she will comment on the main issues of the world energy scene and the objectives and activities that WEC will develop on this new stage under her presidency.

After this review of some of the major issues on the international energy agenda, two Round Tables will take place concerning subjects that are considered to require specific analysis from a global perspective: "Unconventional Resources: a Game Changer in the Rules of Geostrategy?" and "Multilateral Framework of Climate Change: Implications for Global Governance".

Despite the exploitation on a commercial basis of unconventional resources is recent, the interest on them has acquired great importance in recent years, as evidenced by the large number of reports published by the main international organisms on this subject.

Perhaps one of the topics that are generating most interest is its potential geo-strategic implications. Once it has been demonstrated its economic viability in the U.S., the possible spread of technology to other regions of the world (China, Europe, South America, etc.) could give a significant twist to the current energy map, which is especially relevant taking into account the geographical distribution of these resources. According to experts, the existing reserves could turn some countries traditionally dependent in terms of energy into self-sufficient and even to exporters.

What new actors are emerging in this new scenario? How are they positioning? Are the rules of geostrategy game changing? What implications might have for Europe? What is the position that the European Union is taking on this matter? These are some of the issues to be analyzed during the first Round Table.

The discussions around climate change are not indifferent to the geopolitical changes and to the economic and financial global situation, on the contrary, these new parameters are reflected in the negotia-

tions where more voices are listened and there are new strategic partners, as it was seen at the last Conference of the Parties held in Doha in December 2012.

After this last Summit, a new phase was opened in the UN negotiations on a single process where all the countries participate, with the goal of developing a new legally binding international agreement that will have to be signed in 2015, and would take into force in 2020.

Although it is considered that steps in the right direction are being done, and despite the positive development of some countries in reducing emissions, according to the International Energy Agency the global energy-related CO<sub>2</sub> emissions increased by 1.4% to reach 31,6 gigatonnes (Gt) in 2012, a historic high. With the current rate of increase in greenhouse gas emissions, the world is not on track to meet the target agreed by governments to limit the long-term rise in the average global temperature to 2 degrees Celsius.

Is it expected to reach agreements in the short and medium term to maintain a realistic chance of achieving this goal? At what point are the climate negotiations? What processes are open? How the changes are impacting in the global governance? Who are the key players in the negotiations? Where will the decisions be taken? These, among others, will be the issues to be addressed in the second Round Table that will help us to better understand the current climate negotiation process.

Along with the participation of relevant stakeholders in energy sector representing renowned international and national institutions, the leaders of the member companies belonging to the CECME will give their opinions on the matters under review in the traditional Front Row which characterizes this event.

Also during the meeting, two monographic sessions will be held presenting, on the one hand, the Spanish results in the WEC Project "Issues MONITOR", and on the other hand, the United Nations Iniciative "Sustainable Energy for all (SE4ALL)".

Finally, in the Conclusions Session & Closing Ceremony, we will have the pleasure of having the participation of Fernando Eguidazu Palacios, General Director of International Economic Relations from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Cooperation (Government of Spain), as well as the organizers and sponsors of the meeting.
